

A VIEW FROM THE BOARD

There is no doubt that this has been a difficult period at corporate level for Welsh Hockey but the aim of the Board has been to try to ensure that it has not affected your ability to and enjoyment of your hockey playing.

You may know that Mike Bull, our CEO, resigned in January. His son is a talented tennis player and the best opportunities were available in Spain. Mike spotted a business opportunity that would enable him to be with his family on a permanent basis – Spain's gain is our loss!

The Board tried to recruit a new CEO but after a long and extensive process no suitable candidate was found. As we were heading into the summer period it was decided to delay any re-advertisement until the autumn and the process will be beginning again shortly – let's hope for more success.

Alan Rookes said this time last year that he had been looking to give up his role as Chairman but had been persuaded to continue. He got more responsibility at work and decided in January that he was no longer able to carry on.

The Board appointed an interim Chair who decided, after four months, that he would prefer to use his talents elsewhere in Welsh Hockey where he felt he could make more of a difference.

Currently the President is chairing meetings and a small group of directors are carrying out the functions of both CEO and Chair. In addition the Sports Council have seconded one of their officers, Ian Blackburn, to the Union for two days a week to assist with the strategic and development plans.

As you will read elsewhere the focus for the next period is club development. We have to make sure that all the youngsters that have come from the development programme have appropriate clubs to go to so that the stability and growth of our sport can be assured.

The website has been running for some while now and is a credit to the hard work of Chris Brewer and others who contribute items. It is a treat to be able to see results for our national teams as the tournament is progressing, often with reports. The professionalism of the site is reflected by the huge number of 'hits' that it receives each week.

We have also started an irregular electronic newsletter called *WHU4U* to try to keep you bang up to date with what's going on. As our new database comes on stream we will be able to send this to individual members as part of our improved communications strategy.

There is a need for improved dialogue with clubs and, this autumn, it is hoped that we can start a regular series of meetings with Chairs of clubs so that you can tell the Board what your problems are and we can tell you what's going on at national level. These will be held in various parts of the country so that it will be easy for club Chairs to attend.

Finally it would be remiss to finish without thanking all the staff and a huge number of volunteers for the extra efforts that they have made to ensure that things have run as smoothly as possible during this transitional period.

Here is a summary of the year's performances

- Whitchurch and Swansea both finished third and are primed to earn promotions in the English National League in 2007.
- Cardiff Men promoted back into the Trophy, and Swansea Ladies performing well in the same division, in the European Clubs
- Our Junior Academy teams did well in the European's, with a bronze medal for the boys and a creditable sixth for the girls
- A determined and at times high quality performance from our U/21 Women against the best countries in Europe, which regrettably was not enough to keep them in the 'A' division, where they finished seventh.
- Competitive performances in the reintroduced Home Nations Competition for our U/18 Boys
- A tour of Holland provided great development for our U/18 Girls

Our regional Coaches, will soon be hard at work in the junior elite development areas, with LETS and the U/13 program poised to commence again for this year, following last years expansion of our talent identification procedures. Sadly, our Junior Performance Manager, Mark Hopkins, has moved on to pastures new, and his dedication and commitment to quality will be missed.

2007 will see the introduction of the GB Superleague, and our teams, The Celtic Panthers will contest over three weekends in March and April, in Edinburgh, Swansea and Manchester. We expect the standard of hockey to be very high, as players vie for places in the GB squads.

Our National sides both contest Europeans in 2007, as will our U/18 Boys and Girls. We are also looking forward to the reintroduction of the U/16 Home Nations.

All in all, an exciting time to come for Welsh Hockey, and I hope that we will see you at some of the forthcoming events. I trust that you will enjoy your season.

COACHING

Mike Williamson, Men's National Team Coach has been selected to attend an FIH High Performance Coaching Event at the Men's Hockey World Cup in Monchengladbach in September. He will join top coaches from around the world to discuss cutting edge developments in techniques and tactics.

Two staff members will be attending a Disability Hockey Awareness event run by the FIH at the World Cup in Germany to explore the feasibility developing a disability hockey product.

WHU in partnership with England and Scotland Hockey under the banner of Hockey Coaching UK has now completed the design of new Coaching Qualifications to meet United Kingdom Coaching Certificate standards at Levels 1, 2 and 3. Already on the QCA Framework via 1st4Sport, these VRQ qualifications, and the associated courses and resources are currently with Sports Coach UK awaiting formal UKCC endorsement. Delivery of these new courses will start early in the new season. Incorporated in the new structure is the opportunity for holders of existing WHU awards to update them to the new qualifications subject of course to some conditions. Whilst the cost and length of courses will be higher than the previous awards, the new VRQ qualifications are significantly more valuable and will carry UK recognition. Now that's something really valuable that coaches and their clubs can use to market themselves when recruiting and attracting new players! Courses are currently being arranged across Wales. A full calendar of formal coaching courses and downloadable application forms can be found on the WHU coaching site. All those holding current coaching WHU awards will be contacted over the coming season with information about converting to the new UK recognised qualifications.

The Sports Council for Wales have confirmed their commitment to coaching by advising that any Community Chest applications seeking grants for coach education and development will be looked on very favorably. Contact your Club Development Officer, local Sports Development Unit or the Welsh Hockey Union Development Section for information on Community Chest Grants.

We are currently looking to recruit more Tutors and Assessors for our coaching courses and qualifications. If you would like to be considered, please contact the Coaching Unit with a full cv covering hockey and any coaching/teaching/lecturing/instructing/tutoring experience. All successful candidates will receive free formal training leading to nationally recognised Tutor and/or Assessor qualifications. All Tutors and Assessors receive payment for coach education work done for the WHU Coaching Unit.

Malcolm Wood, WHU High Performance Coaching Consultant will be running a number of coaching workshops on various topics in North and South Wales over the coming season. Topics include amongst others, Attacking Play, Team Defence, Core Skills, Goalkeeping (see below) and Coaching Indoor Hockey. Flyers and application forms for all workshops will be placed on the WHU coaching site as soon as details have been finalised.

Pam Richards U21 Womens Head Coach has been accepted onto the Women in High Performance Coaching Programme. The only coach in Wales currently on the programme, Pam will join coaches from a number of other sports across the UK at conferences and seminars to further their development as high performance coaches. Previous conference lecturers include David Whitaker (GB Olympic Hockey Gold Medal winning coach) and Sir Clive Woodward.

Former Great Britain Double Olympian Goalkeeper Simon Mason has been signed up to run two Goalkeeper Coaching Workshops for Welsh Hockey next year.

Two new Coaching for Teachers courses will be rolled out during the forthcoming season to add to the existing FUNdamentals course that has proved very popular with Primary School Teachers across Wales. Designed by WHU Grass Roots Coaching Consultant Margaret Medlow, these two new courses are aimed at Key Stages 2 to 3 (Transitions) and Key Stage 3 (Introduction to Game Play). A calendar of Coaching for Teachers courses and application forms are available for download on the WHU coaching site.

This phase is dedicated to club development, to help provide support to new and existing hockey clubs in Wales to enable them to meet the new challenges and demands that have been created through initiatives such as Dragon Sport. An exciting time ahead for the development officers but also for all clubs in Wales as well.

All clubs will soon be receiving 'Club Audit' papers to fill out. It is vital that these are filled in and returned as we will then be able pin-point areas which need addressing within your clubs structure and provide appropriate support. The development officers' proven success within the development field can only serve to help your club go from strength to strength.

Anwen Owen, National Youth Development Manager, is now overseeing all of our Activator's development and programmes. Now in its fourth successive year the Activator programme, dedicated to bringing the Youth into all aspects of hockey is thriving. The Welsh Youth Conference is soon to take place at the Welsh Institute of Sport where competition for places are once again extremely high and the rewards potentially great as Bethan Walsh, Chloe Guy and Jon Elliott can vouch for in their experiences already through the programme. Our National Trainer, Sarah Powell has been working tirelessly in developing our Hockey NVQ's (Coaching Teaching & Instruction Level's 2 & 3). Unfortunately, Sarah is soon to move onto pastures new but we take this opportunity to thank her for all her hard work and dedication on this project and her involvement with Sportrain and the WHU. Without the structured approach that has been in place over the last four years, the fervour and dedication of present and past staff, and the continued advice and support from the Sports Council for Wales, the task of overseeing the Development section would be much harder, if not impossible, particularly on a part-time voluntary basis.

STRATEGIC PLANNING – THE WAY FORWARD

Congratulations! I salute you if you've managed to read past the title. Most normal people switch off instantly when you start to talk about strategic plans, me included.

However, as I've found, most businesses revolve around planning their strategy and the Welsh Hockey Union are no different. We rely heavily on funding from the Sports Council for Wales (SCW) and in order to secure that money we have to provide them with our strategic direction for the foreseeable future.

Our last strategic plan covered the period 2002-2006. Some of you may have seen it, but I would be surprised if anyone has looked at it more than once. I don't think it's unreasonable to say it doesn't make for easy reading.

The plan that we are producing to cover the period April 2007 to March 2009 is hopefully going to be a lot more user friendly and relevant to everyone. It sets out how we see the WHU progressing over the next 2-3 years and which areas we will be concentrating on. The detailed indicators that will make up the targets, on which we will be measured, will be contained in a separate operational plan.

If you're still with me, in a nutshell, the background to the focus of our new strategy is the Welsh Assembly Government's (WAG) 20 year strategy for sport & physical activity – 'Climbing Higher'. The strategy has three main focuses – Governance; Performance; and Development; and we have been asked to consider the areas in which we can make the biggest impact.

As a team sport competing as Great Britain at the Olympics, and with both senior teams needing to qualify for the Commonwealth Games, we would find it hard to make a significant impression in the short term. That is not to say that we are not looking to contribute in the long term on the performance side, it's just that for the period of time ending March 2009, we feel that the biggest contribution can be made through the grass roots development of the game.

Under normal circumstances the honour of writing the strategic plan would fall to the Chief Executive, however this time, the Board have rolled up their sleeves, practised their best handwriting, and pulled together the new document. We're working on completing it by September and then we want to send it out to all stakeholders for consultation. That means you'll all get a chance to read it and comment. (I can tell you can't wait!!).

Seriously though, the plan is an important document because without it we wouldn't have any SCW funding. We want everyone in Welsh Hockey to be comfortable with the content and so we would greatly value any feedback or comments that you wish to make.

UMPIRE AND TECHNICAL SNIPPETS

When is the hockey “out of season”?? Well never it would appear as some umpires and technical officials have had one continuous hockey season with so many tournaments and matches now being played. Since the beginning of May there have been a number of senior internationals, European Nations under 21 and 16 tournaments, under 18 internationals, European club competitions, mixed and vets internationals. In total, Wales provided over twenty umpires and technical officials to these events. Who said that the summer was for rest and the family??

Hurray!!!! The FIH has announced that there will be a new rules book for 2007, (which will be forwarded to all WHU schools and clubs with the next mailing), with implementation of new rules in January 2007. A summary of the changes are detailed elsewhere in this newsletter. Also look at the WHU website where the WHUA has a section dealing with umpiring matters and you will find important information on any changes.

However as from **1st June 2006** for all levels of hockey the maximum bow/rake of the stick has being reduced from 50mm to **25mm** when laid down with the playing side facing the ground. The FIH has also stipulated that the front side of the stick must be flat and smooth and the introduction of any grooves or slots is forbidden. If you buy a new stick for the season be careful and remember that all sticks must conform to this new dimension. If it does not, then you will be prevented from playing with it!!

In an effort to develop umpires the WHUA are hoping to appoint a Development Co-ordinator in the early part of the new season. Watch out for the advertisement! It is absolutely necessary to encourage more to take up the whistle, especially younger people. This new position will encourage the continuation and development of new umpires and assist the Regional Development Officers. If you have a requirement for umpire courses please contact either Carolyn Llewellyn, South Wales Development Officer, Tel: 02920 882696 or Ann Houlston, North Wales Development Officer, Tel: 01745 582938 or the WHU Development Unit for details on the junior umpire courses. Through the assistance of the Sports Council for Wales an Umpire Development Consultant was contracted for a 6 months period to produce important tutorials and write a 3 year Development Plan. The outcomes of this work are now being considered and being introduced as necessary.

Well, it is now not long to the start of another season and another plea to clubs, players, parents, teachers, to get involved and start providing umpires or even trying it yourself. There is someone near to you who will assist you in getting started and providing you with the right advice. All leagues in Wales are now getting desperately short of umpires and to assist the Leagues the WHUA will make the list of qualified and registered umpires available to them. HOCKEY RULES BOARD

FIH release 'The Rules of Hockey 2007/08'

The FIH has recently published The Rules of Hockey for 2007/8. Only a few innovative changes were introduced in this set of rules that marks a move to a two-year cycle for their production and publication. This means that these rules cover the period 1 January 2007 to 31 December 2008 at international level although, as in the past, national hockey associations have discretion to decide the date of implementation at national level.

In some ways, a two-year cycle was already in place because significant changes were not introduced in the periods leading to each Olympic Games and Hockey World Cup. The 2006 rules will therefore apply in the two upcoming World Cups to be played in September and October 2006, but the 2007/8 rules are being published now so that nations who are not involved in these events or who start their playing season in the next few months can adopt them sooner if they wish. *(Editors note: WHU will be introducing the rules with effect from 1st January 2007)*

Two year cycle

Els van Breda Vriesman, President of the FIH, welcomed the adoption of a two-year cycle. "By formalising this cycle, we're acknowledging that it's better to allow a slightly longer period between rules changes for them to settle down and to be evaluated and reviewed. This gives everyone involved in hockey a clearer timetable on which to focus when developing the rules to make the game even more attractive to play and watch," the FIH President stated.

In this context, there are some rules changes for 2007/8. Wolfgang Rommel, Chairman of the Hockey Rules Board (HRB) observed. "We've looked closely at goalkeeping," said Rommel. "We've set out three clear options: playing with a goalkeeper wearing full protective equipment; a goalkeeper just wearing protective headgear; or no goalkeeper at all."

In the middle option, the HRB has formalised what players sometimes know as a 'kicking back' can and cannot do. If there is no goalkeeper, Rommel explains the following procedures. "This really means what it says: the team is playing only with field players. No player can then kick the ball in the circle and so on." This option allows a team, if they wish, to press all their players forward with nobody committed to defending the circle. It also overcomes a previous technicality which sometimes occurred at local levels where there was nobody with goalkeeping kit or if the goalkeeper had been delayed on their way to the ground! Strictly according to the rules, a game could not take place unless there was a goalkeeper wearing protective headgear on the field.

More flexibility

Still on the subject of goalkeeping, the 2007/8 rules permit a goalkeeper more flexibility when defending their goal. They can now sweep the ball away with their hand. "We don't want to make life too easy for goalkeepers but we also don't want to restrict them in petty ways", Richard Aggiss, former national player, coach to Australia and member of the HRB comments. "We're therefore happy for them to push the ball away with their hands or body but we don't want to see them rushing to a ball entering the circle and swiping it to the centre-line with their hand protector".

Aggiss was also pleased to see the clarification now added about how defenders can stop a high shot at goal with their sticks. "Some umpires were being far too strict because the rule could be interpreted that way," he added. "We want to make it clear that it isn't an offence when stopping a shot above shoulder height if the defender's stick is not motionless or is travelling towards the ball. As a player and coach, I know it's virtually impossible to get to the ball and for the stick to be motionless, when you make contact with the ball."

Easier to understand

The rules changes made by the HRB follow from its objectives which include making the game easier to understand. "This objective is easier to state than to deliver. We have to get a balance between many things," Gill Clarke, a World Cup and Olympic umpire and now a member of the HRB, commented. "An extremely simple game may be easier for spectators to understand and then require few skills but would not be so enjoyable and stimulating to play. We also have to bear in mind that the rules apply throughout the game. They apply to adults and children. To young players and veterans. To women and men. To experienced skilful players and to players just starting out in the game. Everyone, whatever their ability and circumstances, must feel that hockey is a game for them."

This means that the work of the HRB is challenging and ongoing. Among other things, it is looking at ways of avoiding crowded defensive circles. The penalty corner is also being scrutinised and is a good example of where the HRB has to strike a balance between something which is skilful and exciting but also safe and not too complicated. There is a desire to see more attacking play while avoiding huge scores and one-sided matches which can be dull to play in or watch. The HRB is also aware that indoor hockey is an important part of the game so will be focussing on it in during the next year or so.

Comments and ideas

The Hockey Rules Board therefore welcomes comments and proposals from throughout the game. It is even the better if ideas are routed through national associations which can add broader comments and make formal recommendations. CHILD PROTECTION MATTERS!

During the latter part of last season a substantial number of Club officers attended one of four scUK courses, which combined with the sessions on CRB form completion, enabled each of those officers to be suitably trained in Child Protection matters at club level. Whilst some clubs in Mid-Wales have yet to have a course arranged for them (due to be organised in Oct/Nov) with all other clubs having had the opportunity to send a representative, those that do not have the scUK course 'Good Practice in Child Protection' under their belt should send their rep to the identical course organised by their Unitary Authority. Bear in mind that it is quite possible that having a qualified CCPO in your club may be compulsory by season 2007/8!

CRB forms have been completed on the majority of those attending the courses although a number have yet to return their forms – **if this relates to you, please complete and return the form ASAP**. A list of those who have received CRB clearance and who have attended the training will shortly be provided to WCVA Criminal Records Unit (our umbrella organisation) to enable them to order and complete CRB forms for all those members requiring checks within their club. To clarify a small point which has been raised by a number of people, CRB forms are non transferable and irrespective if a check had been undertaken on them by a different organisation a new form must be completed for the WHU. Similarly, simply by completing a check does not qualify the person as being trained in Child Protection.

We are finalising all the Child Protection documents that will be placed on the WHU website which will enable CCPO's to fill in the gaps on the various documents with their club name, thereby saving themselves time and effort in ensuring their club is compliant. Full instructions will be issued in due course.
